Foreword from our CEO

Dear supporters,

As we reflect on the past year, I am struck by both the urgency of our mission and the tangible progress made possible through your support. At Borneo Orangutan Survival UK, our role is to connect the commitment of supporters here in Britain with the extraordinary, on-the-ground conservation work taking place in Indonesia. In 2025, that connection has never been more vital.

The challenges facing orangutans and their rainforest habitat remain profound. Deforestation, habitat fragmentation, and the lasting impacts of climate change continue to threaten one of our closest relatives and one of the most important ecosystems on Earth. Yet, alongside these challenges, there is real and measurable hope.

This year, thanks to your generosity, we have helped sustain the rescue, rehabilitation, and long-term care of hundreds of orangutans. Each individual represents not just a life saved, but a step toward rebuilding wild populations. At the same time, critical habitat protection and reforestation efforts have continued to restore degraded landscapes, ensuring that when orangutans are ready to return to the wild there is a forest waiting for them.

What sets this work apart is its scale and its permanence. This is not short-term intervention. It is the patient, complex rebuilding of ecosystems, combining science, community partnership, and long-term commitment. It is also proof that conservation, when properly supported, works.

In the UK, we have focused on growing awareness, strengthening partnerships, and engaging policymakers and supporters alike. From parliamentary engagement to donor outreach, we are building a broader coalition of people who understand that protecting orangutans is inseparable from protecting our shared climate and biodiversity.

None of this would be possible without you. Your support enables action in some of the most challenging environments on Earth, turning concern into meaningful, lasting impact.

The future of Borneo's forests is not yet secure, but it is still within our power to shape. Together, we are not only protecting orangutans. We are helping to ensure that entire ecosystems, and the life they support, endure for generations to come.

The Nyaru Menteng II Forest School and students were successfully relocated in February, enjoying a safe and smooth journey to the new and improved site. Fundraising continues to build new Sanctuary Islands, which offer freedom for unreleasable orangutans.

At BOS, our priority is orangutan welfare, which is built into orangutan rehabilitation. Without proper access to medical care, many of these orphaned orangutans would not survive. A vital step is providing them a safe place to heal.

A combination of match funding from The Big Give and public fundraising supported expertly-trained teams to effectively release orangutans back to the wild. Every release involves months of planning and careful execution, followed by two years of monitoring and tracking. This is all to ensure the species can thrive for generations.

A big move for Forest School

On 26th February, Forest School Group 4 was successfully transferred to Nyaru Menteng II first, followed by Group 5. The young orangutans all travelled safely in transport crates without sedation. On arrival, they settled into their new night enclosures before exploring their new Forest School the next day.

The younger Group 2 orangutans made their journey by bus, enjoying a safe and smooth trip with their Surrogate Mothers.

We are grateful to everyone who supports BOS UK and orangutans like Fani who have a second chance to break free from captivity and exist free from harm on Sanctuary Islands.



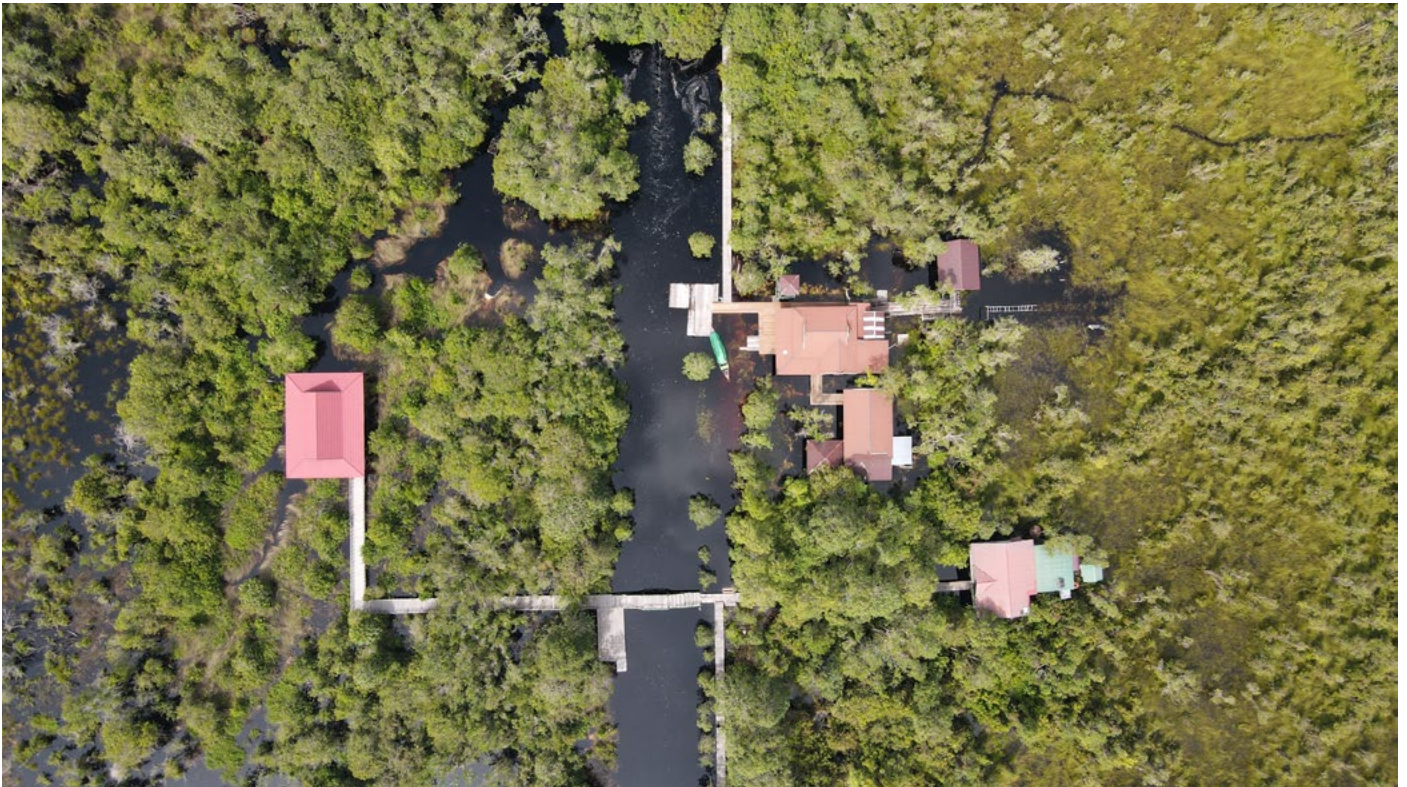
Known for her long locks, Fani was a distinctive presence at BOS and will be remembered fondly.

Sebangau: The newest BOS Foundation stronghold for orangutans

The BOS Foundation's newest protected forest, Sebangau National Park, is a unique peatland ecosystem. It's one of the most important strongholds for Bornean orangutans, home to over 8,000 individuals. This biodiverse landscape also supports proboscis monkeys, gibbons, sun bears, and rare orchids, making it a vital habitat for a wide range of species.

Once heavily impacted by logging, the forest's network of canals were drained and the peat degraded. Today, restoration efforts are reversing this damage by rewetting the land, subsequently raising water levels to restore the peat's natural balance. This not only protects wildlife and reduces the risk of devastating fires, but also preserves the forest's role as a critical carbon sink.

By restoring Sebangau, BOS Foundation is safeguarding a future where orangutans, forests, and local communities can thrive together.

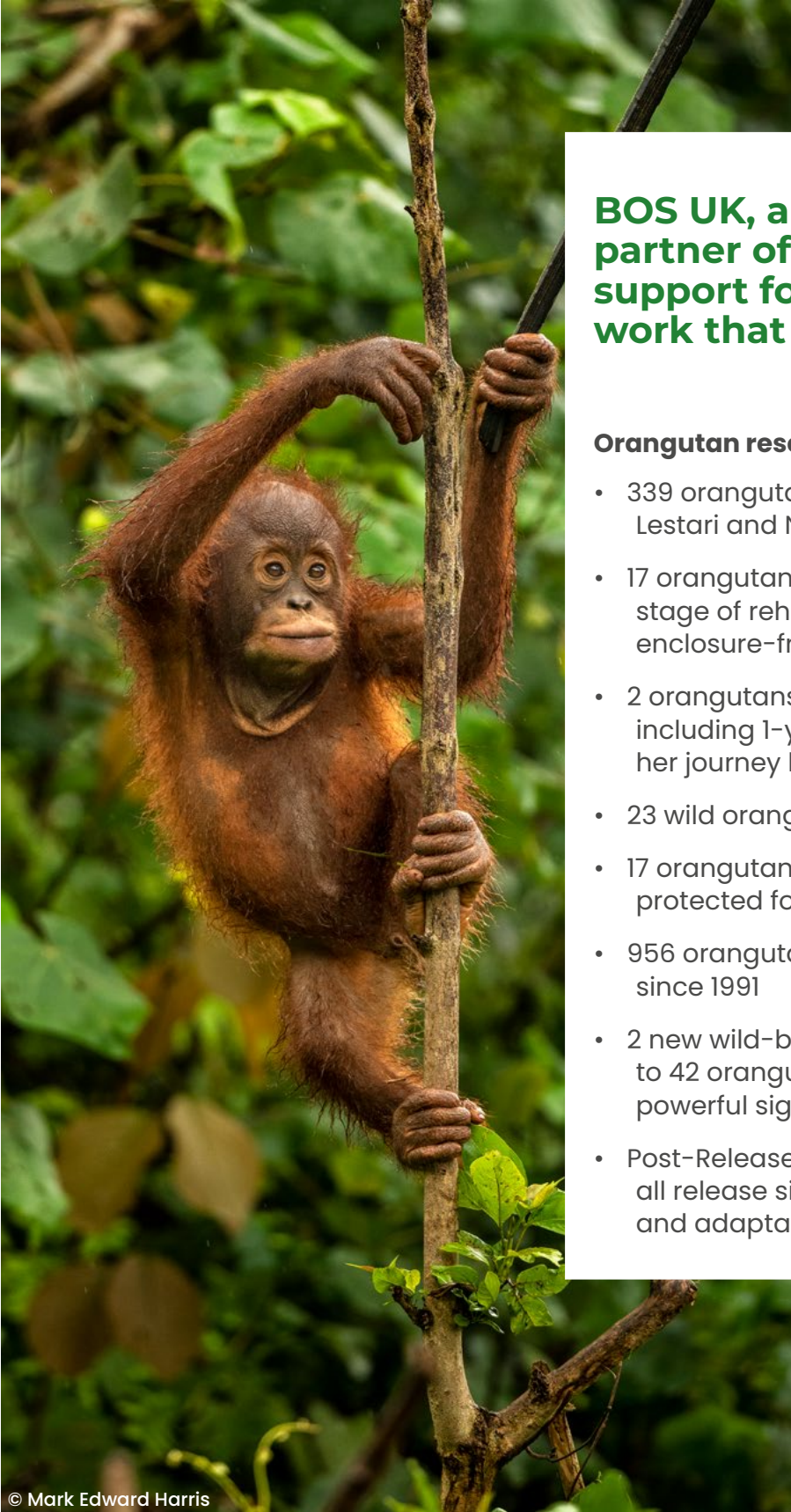

BOS UK, along with its global partner offices, provided support for BOS Foundation's work that included:

Orangutan rescue, rehabilitation, and release

- 339 orangutans under care across Samboja Lestari and Nyaru Menteng II
- 17 orangutans progressed to the final stage of rehabilitation, moving to forested, enclosure-free islands
- 2 orangutans rescued or handed over, including 1-year-old Momo, now beginning her journey back to the wild
- 23 wild orangutans safely translocated
- 17 orangutans successfully released into protected forests TNBBBR and Kehje Sewen
- 956 orangutans reintroduced to the wild since 1991
- 2 new wild-born babies, bringing the total to 42 orangutans born free in the forest. A powerful sign that rehabilitation works
- Post-Release Monitoring teams active across all release sites, tracking health, behaviour, and adaptation to life in the wild

Sanctuary care

- 75 sun bears in lifelong care
- Jujun and Vera began their new lives on Sanctuary Islands
- 132 unreleasable orangutans received lifelong sanctuary care, living in safe, enriched environments that prioritise dignity and safety

Ecosystem conservation

- Sustained 168.01 hectares of Samboja Lestari forest through replacement planting and weeding. Reforestation efforts were expanded with the planting of 8,237 trees across an additional 20.24 hectares.
- Conducted 660 patrols to prevent illegal activities and fire – a collaborative effort with the Central Kalimantan Natural Resources Conservation Agency (BKSDA), alongside 13 community patrol teams representing 9 villages and 3 sub-villages within the Mawas Conservation Area



Community development

- Worked with 9 villages surrounding TNBBR to strengthen sustainable livelihoods and community-led forest protection
- Partnered with Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities to play a leading role in conserving forests, ensuring orangutans and people thrive together



WHERE THE WORK HAPPENS

BOS is dedicated to conserving Bornean orangutans and their habitat. This work spans across East and Central Kalimantan, from protected forest with orangutan release sites to rehabilitation centres. Every area matters with each one helping secure the future of this keystone species. With your support, this work continues to grow, so explore this intrepid map of the BOS Foundation in action.

Bukit Baka Bukit Raya National Park (TNBBBR)

A national park composed of approximately 181,090 ha of protected mineral forest, this area serves as home to the newly reintroduced population of 226 adult orangutans and 10 wild born babies, as well as to PRM teams and their camps where they track and record orangutans' behavioural data.

Bukit Batikap Protection Forest

A 456,000 ha conservation area of protection rainforest with elevations ranging from 100 to 1,580 m, this nearly

pristine primary forest provides food and shelter for 195 released orangutans and 18 wild born babies who are observed by our PRM teams in the camp.

Nyaru Menteng II Rehabilitation Centre

Currently home to 228 orangutans in BOS Foundation's care, Forest School gives rescued orangutans the opportunity to learn natural skills and socialise in preparation for the wild. The healthcare and quarantine facilities are host to a dedicated team of veterinarians treating the orangutans at this centre. This site also oversees many other BOS Foundation programmes such as rescue, release, sanctuary care, habitat conservation, and community development.

Sebangau National Park

BOS Foundation's newest working area is situated within 9,600 ha of this peat swamp forest for the preservation of orangutans, proboscis monkeys, wild cats, pencil orchids, and Asian water birds. Monitoring also takes place here as it's home to Bangah and Mangkok camp. Currently, there are ongoing ecosystem restoration projects including canal blocking and mapping fire-prone areas, as well as planning for community development programmes.

Salat Island cluster

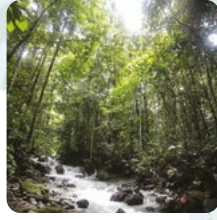
A 2,089 ha island cluster that includes Badak Besar Pre-release Island (496 ha) and Badak Kecil Sanctuary Island (104 ha). Here, some orangutans take one step closer to freedom, while others are provided with lifelong care.

Kehje Sewen Ecosystem Restoration Concession (ERC) Forest

Established as an Ecosystem Restoration Concession (ERC) in 2010, by Restorasi Habitat Orangutan Indonesia (RHOI), a company established by the BOS Foundation, the Kehje Sewen ERC is a protected area covering 86,450 ha of forest. Currently, 135 released orangutans and their 11 wild born babies reside there. In the local Dayak Wehea language, the name Kehje Sewen translates to orangutan.

This 82ha forest island was officially inaugurated to be a BOS Foundation Pre-release Island in September 2017. Daily, teams of technicians provide supplementary food for the rehabilitated orangutan populations and observe to ensure they are suitable for wild release.

Samboja Lestari

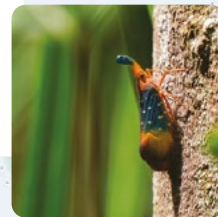
Formerly degraded and burnt land, Samboja Lestari Rescue Centre now includes nearly 1,800 hectares (ha) of restored forest. Activities here include rescue, rehabilitation, release, and sanctuary care for 110 orangutans. 76 sun bears are cared for in a permanent sanctuary with access to forested enclosures and support from caregivers. This area also has habitat conservation and community development programmes. Additionally, it is also home to Samboja Lodge, an element of comfort nestled amongst the rainforest, inspired by local Dayak architecture. This is where our Rainforest Retreat and Wildlife in Focus trips take place.

Sungai Wein Protected Forest

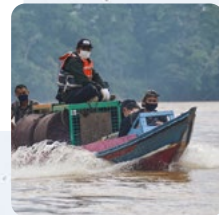
One of the last intact coastal lowland rainforests in East Kalimantan, this was the first BOS release location where 60 orangutans were released from 1992-1994.

Bukit Beratus Protected Forest

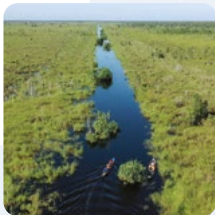
Hundreds of orangutans previously living at the Wanariset Centre were released into freedom here from 1998-2003.

Mawas Conservation Area

A protected area of 309,000 ha including peatland habitat that sustains one of the largest remaining orangutan populations with an estimated 2550 individuals. The area encompasses forest restoration, community empowerment projects, and protection and research of wild orangutan populations.

BOS UK's impact, with your help:

A mammoth problem

In April 2025, we launched our "Orangutans Are Facing a Mammoth Problem" campaign, linking the orangutans' plight to that of the Woolly Mammoth. With over £400,000 of donated billboard and poster space, our message reached an estimated 19 million people across the UK. It sparked new conversations and inspired donors, some of whom gave specifically after seeing the billboards. Alongside the billboards, we extended the campaign online to amplify awareness even further.

This was a collaboration with Truant as part of their 1% for the Planet pledge.

In-person engagement grew significantly this year, with our team bringing the orangutan conservation directly to you at a long list of events such as conferences and shows. These moments created space for powerful, face-to-face conversations to turn awareness into action.

This engagement has led to significant growth in our adoption programme, leading to over 1,100 new orangutan supporters!

The Big Give Green Match Fund

BOS UK participated in The Big Give's Green Match for the first time this year. On Day 2 of this 7 day matched fundraising event, our £3000 target was exceeded thanks to our incredible donors.

This supported the Orangutan Freedom project as part of a global, long-term campaign. It will help safely release individual orangutans back into the wild to aid the rebuilding of the population, whilst strengthening the broader ecosystem. It is central to BOS's Rescue, rehabilitation, and release mission.



On release day in 2025, after 21 long years, 45kg Berunay stepped into the wild forest once more. That same day she built her nest ~200m from the release point, feeding on forest fig (figus), and starting her new life. Her successful reintroduction is a testament to the perseverance, care, and long-term support of all donors and BOS Foundation staff.

The release, funded by incredible donors like you and the Big Give Trust, has made a clear impact: 4 orangutans have been successfully released into the wild, which is a powerful demonstration of conservation work in action.

Virtual Field Trips

At the end of 2025, we relaunched our education programme with Virtual Field Trips for ages 5+ and new Life Long Learners sessions. These 45-minute, educator-led experiences bring the rainforests of Borneo directly into classrooms and homes, creating engaging and immersive learning opportunities.

Our work was also featured in *AV Magazine* in partnership with Uphall Primary School, showcasing our programme as a powerful form of curriculum enrichment with a “live window into the rainforests of Borneo.”

By connecting with audiences virtually, we remove geographical barriers and make conservation education accessible to all. Participants don’t just learn about orangutans and rainforest ecosystems, they experience them in real time, fostering deeper understanding and long-term engagement.

All-Party Parliamentary Group meeting between BOS UK and government

22nd October

BOS UK was invited by ICCF (International Conservation Caucus Foundation) to provide an update to the APPG (All-Party Parliamentary Group) on International Conservation in Parliament on the status of orangutan conservation. CEO, Ben Callison, co-presented alongside a representative from Chester Zoo.

In attendance was Baroness Coffey, Barry Gardiner MP, Lord Gascoigne, Lord Grayling, and Alex Sobel MP. The talk was well received and following the meeting there has been discussions for a potential cross-party delegation trip to Indonesia for delegates to gain a better understanding of orangutan and rainforest conservation in Indonesia.

Raising funds

Film continues to be a powerful tool for raising awareness and brings the story of orangutans and their forest home to global audiences in ways that inspire empathy and action.

Based on the beloved novel by Michael Morpurgo, this film explores survival, friendship, and the deep connection between humans and nature.

At the same time, we expanded and empowered our volunteer network, an inspiring community whose energy and commitment play a vital role in raising awareness and driving conservation action.

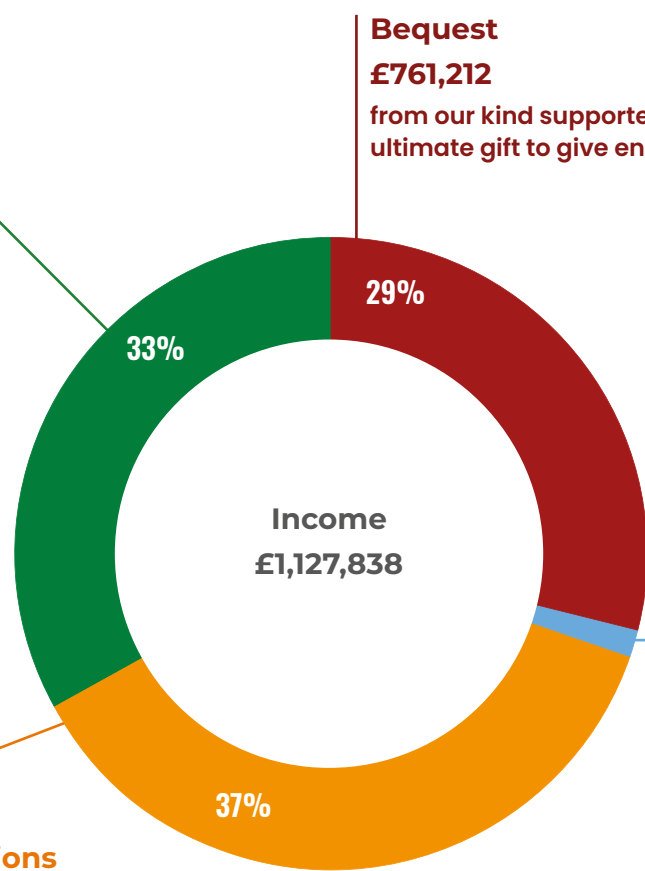

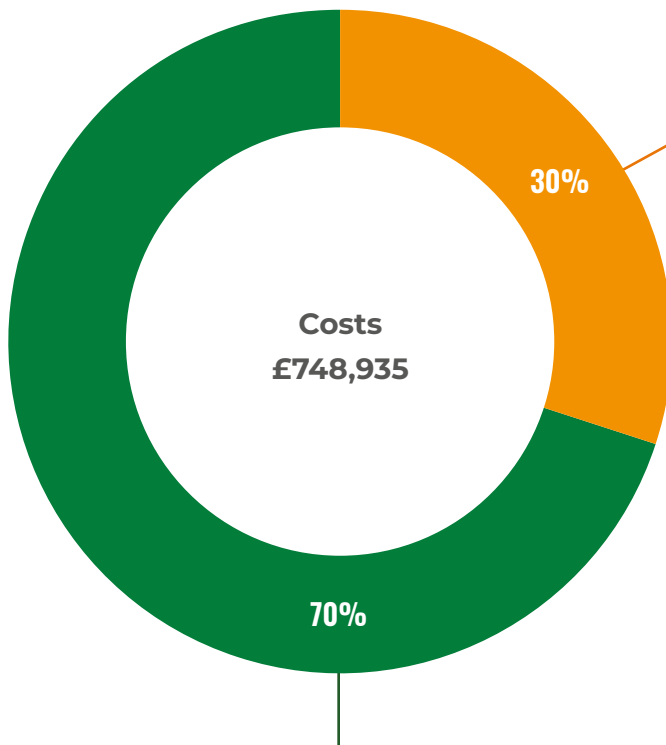
